Emergency Reimbursement Program (Family Support Service): The Emergency Program provides reimbursement up to \$1,000 for people who have developmental disabilities and need emergency support. The requests may be for goods and/or short term services that will support the person during the time of an emergency. A wide variety of goods and services will be considered, including: costs to replace items lost in a fire, mattress replacement after bed bug infestation, utility suspensions, eviction risks and Emergency Respite Care. Emergency Respite Care is temporary care of a person with a developmental disability provided on an emergency basis due to a family situation of extreme urgency, such as, but not limited to the hospitalization of a family member, unexpected emergency travel plans or relief needed for the caregiver due to special circumstances. Criteria for program enrollment: resides with family in Brooklyn or Queens, OPWDD eligibility. For more information call 212-895-3478. OVERNIGHT/EMERGENCY In-Home Hourly Respite Hourly Program: This type of Respite is a temporary care of an individual with intellectual and developmental disabilities provided on an emergency basis due to a family/caregiver situation of extreme urgency, such as the hospitalization of a family member or unexpected travel plans. The overnight/emergency respite services ensure that the person receiving supports is safe and his/her basic needs are met. Emergency respite is provided in individual's home. A caregiver must reside with the individual in the same household. An applying person should be OPWDD eligible. Services are provided to families residing in the boroughs of Queens and Manhattan. Contact Patricia Glasgow, Program Intake Supervisor at 212-780-4482. IN-HOME RESPITE PROGRAM: is designed to provide a relief for the caregiver. The in-home respite services ensure that the person receiving supports is safe and his/her basic needs are met. A caregiver must reside with the individual in the same household. The caregiver does not need to be present in the home during service provision hours. Services can be provided in the home or out in the community. Individual applying for services must be OPWDD waiver eligible. We are open for people ages 3 and over in 5 boroughs of NYC. Cannot be seriously medically involved where extra nursing staff would be necessary. There are availabilities in Manhattan, the Bronx, and Queens only. Families should apply for respite before the need arises; the application has to be approved beforehand. Contact the Referral and Information Center at (212) 780-4491.







### For New Graduates and young adults - Eprine developed its Community Enrichment Program

The Community Enrichment Program is a community-based Day Habilitation Without Walls program that serves motivated young adults who wish to be active and productive. Assistance is provided to adults with intellectual disabilities who are in need of life skills training which could carry into career exploration. The program promotes individual independence and opportunities to grow and mature into responsible adults.

This model significantly increases the community-based experiences and job readiness skills of the new graduate. The program began to prepare individuals based on resources available in the community to support each individual as they adjust from school to adult life.





### Accepting Applications

### **Community Habilitation**

Community Habilitation services are habilitation services that are provided to individuals who at home with a family member or by themselves. This service fosters independence, integration, individuality and productivity in the community. Our Program includes provision for self-directed and family directed Community Habilitation Services, which will enhance flexibility and freedom of choice. Individuals participate in adaptive skill development, assistance with activities of daily living (hands-on), community inclusion and relationship building, training and support for independence in travel, transportation, adult educational supports, development of social skills, leisure skills, self-advocacy and informed choice skills, and appropriate behavior development to help the individual access their community.

All participants must be eligible for OPWDD Services and enrolled in Medicaid Services Coordination (MSC)

### **Respite Services**

Respite services provide temporary relief from the demands of care giving, which helps reduce overall family stress. This often enables families to better meet the needs of their loved one with a developmental disability. Respite can be provided in the home or out of the home, during the day, evenings or overnight.

### Children's Services

A child first, a child with autism second: this principle drives our **COMMITMENT** to provide the fullest life experiences possible for our students and their families when it is needed most - **RIGHT NOW.** Using evidence-based treatment with personalized compassionate care, our educational, residential, life skills development, and after school programs provide opportunities to experience all the milestones that a child deserves.

Through our innovative year-round day and residential children's programs, we are committed to providing a comprehensive array of LIFELONG LEARNING<sup>SM</sup> opportunities while meeting the unique educational, social, emotional, and communicative needs of each student we serve.

Anderson Center for Autism's students (ages 5 to 21) exhibit a wide range of skills and abilities, with moderate to severe learning, communicative, and behavioral challenges. The Children's Program, in tandem with LifeLong Learning<sup>SM</sup> skill-building opportunities, meets these daily challenges with the core foundation of trust, safety, wellness, well-being, and expertise.

### **Education Program**

Mirroring New York State educational standards and incorporating the Positive Behavioral Supports model, goals and objectives are identified for each student that target life skills domains including communication, social interaction, organization, and independence. Proactive support strategies reinforce learning and increasingly challenge students as they develop new skills.

Certified special educators, behavior specialists/analysts, and speech and occupational therapists provide collaborative, interdisciplinary classroom instruction and expertly blend educational, environmental, and sensory supports into a seamless therapeutic milieu. Technology in the classroom such as iPads and interactive whiteboards provide a richer learning environment to better shape the learning process.

Student progress and learning milestones are shared with families and school districts through quarterly reports, annual and alternate assessments, meetings, phone conversations with case managers or teachers, email correspondence, and more. Our staff celebrate each victory along the way with the child and their family.

### Residential Program

We can never replace home but we can provide a nurturing environment where your child can express his or herself freely, learn and grow without inhibition, and be accepted and supported by peers, staff, and the larger community.

The Anderson Village provides a secure community-driven environment in which students are paired by age, ability, and supportive needs. This ensures a comfortable living experience that encourages further development of life and social skills outside the classroom. Residential staff are specially trained to understand each student as a unique individual.

Family connections are vital to the development and happiness of our youngsters. Anderson Center encourages healthy family relationships via private family time at our on-campus Family Visiting Centers, events for families, and home visits whenever possible.

#### After School Program

After school activities provide opportunities for enrichment outside the classroom in a variety of recreational and interest-specific arenas. These after school activities change as interests of the students evolve.

#### **Anderson Athletics**

Being part of a team fosters comradery. It motivates people to develop their body and mind and offers the chance to be recognized for one's abilities. Anderson Athletics empowers our children and adults to accomplish great things, bringing life experiences that help our individuals show their innate talent, focus, dedication, and strength with guidance and encouragement of our volunteer coaches and support staff.

### Case Management

Anderson Center's Case Managers are the primary advocates for the children we serve and every parent or guardian's official contact in the children's program. Let us help navigate future placement and transition services for your child into adulthood, act as a liaison with outside agencies, assist in accessing benefits and entitlements for your child, and more.

#### **Clinical Services**

Our Clinical Department addresses the particular social, emotional, and behavioral needs of the individuals we serve using evidence-based practices in assessment, treatment, and professional training. Our team of experts includes Licensed Clinical Psychologists, Board Certified Behavior Analysts (BCBA), Speech Language Pathologists and Therapists, Occupational Therapists, Physical Therapists, Licensed Mental Health Counselors, and Certified School Psychologists.

#### Health and Related Services

*Health Services:* Health Services specialists collaborate with support staff, families, and community based physicians from Albany to Westchester who provide routine and critical or emergency care services.

Speech and Language Therapy: Our speech and language services are designed to foster and enhance the communicative and social functioning-related development of our students and adults, improving quality of life and our individuals' ability to engage in the community.

Occupational Therapy and Physical Therapy: Based on an assessment of each individual as a "whole person," our occupational therapy services address the sensory, fine motor, interpersonal, cognitive, and environmental factors that impact an individual's ability to function in school, play/leisure, and self-care. Modalities include individual and group interventions, classroom consultations, and environmental modifications.

#### Medicaid Service Coordination (MSC)


Medicaid Service Coordinators provide linkage and referral services to individuals by identifying appropriate and beneficial services, programs, and funding sources. Individuals in our children's program may be eligible for this service if they attend school as day students or as an older day or residential student transitioning to adult services.

### The Admissions Process

Our admissions staff create an atmosphere of compassionate support and cultivate effective communication with clear information on the options available to help you and your loved one successfully navigate this journey.

Our process includes an in-person interview, a comprehensive overview of all programs and supports provided from school and day programs to residential living and transitional services, and a tour of our 100-acre campus. Anderson Center operates on a continuous 12-month program, accepting referrals for individuals throughout the United States.



From serving a single individual in 1924 to touching the lives of more than 500 today, Anderson Center for Autism has always worked toward fostering *positive outcomes*. A common phrase to some, but for all of us at Anderson it symbolizes hope, fulfillment and personal satisfaction. Most educational institutions are guided solely by regulations and minimum standards, but Anderson Center is committed to going above and beyond to provide the best possible outcomes for each individual we serve—from childhood to adulthood.

### All Individuals Deserve to Live a Life of Quality

What makes for a good life? Whether neuro-typical or on the autism spectrum, all people deserve to live a life of quality. Anderson Center has adopted a LifeLong Learning<sup>SM</sup> System that is founded on the measurement of an individual's quality of life (Q of L) and developed system wide initiatives that are directed at optimizing this outcome. The San Martin Scale is an evidence-based tool that measures all of the components that comprise a life of quality. This measure will be used to direct agency actions specific to the needs of an individual as well as larger agency-wide initiatives for all the individuals we serve.

In partnership with Marist College in Poughkeepsie, N.Y., Anderson Center's adaptation of the tool has been translated and validated in an attempt to gain further insight and opportunities to provide meaningful outcomes for everyone we serve, children and adults.

### **Eight Domains of Quality of Life**

At Anderson Center for Autism, we use all the tools at our command to listen carefully and explore deeply in order to best understand where each individual relates to the Q of L Domains at a given point in their lives. This allows us to see patterns of growth over time, and identify areas where we could better support an individual in fulfilling their desires and dreams.

- > **Self-Determination:** encouraging personal choice and involvement in decision-making, as well as ability for self-expression
- Emotional Well-Being: understanding observable behaviors and forms of expression, and taking measures to provide stable and supportive environments and interactions
- Physical Well-Being: helping to provide and manage adequate diet, hygiene, physical activity, and health-related support
- Material Well-Being: providing a sense of personal physical space, a comfortable communication system, and a well-adapted environment
- > Rights: displaying ethics, respect, discretion, and privacy
- > Personal Development: providing opportunities for enrichment, obtainment and demonstration of new skills, and stimulation in varied areas
- > **Social Inclusion:** providing opportunities to visit other environments, enjoyment of inclusive environments and events, and participation outside normal program perimeters
- Interpersonal Relations: utilizing best practices in communicating information, encouraging opportunities for personal interactions, celebrating events of personal importance, and providing understanding on an individual level

### **Empowering Philosophy**

Quality of life is not a formula, but rather the mission of Anderson Center for Autism that directs all programming toward optimizing each individual's quality of life. Living this mission daily in our work with individuals, we see its extraordinary impact on families, neighbors and communities. As one person grows and achieves their desired outcomes, others around them notice and respond in new ways that reinforce and continue to build a positive cycle of quality of life. 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## THE OFFICE OF SPECIAL EDUCATION EDUCATIONAL PARTNERSHIP

The New York State Education Department (NYSED) Office of Special Education (OSE) is creating a coordinated and cohesive network of support focused on enhancing services and supports for students with disabilities from early childhood and school-age education to engagement in post-school opportunities. The network will be called the OSE Educational Partnership and will increase district capacity using an intensive team approach to technical assistance and professional development that is implemented with consistency across New York State.

The OSE Educational Partnership is designed to improve outcomes for students with disabilities and better support schools and families.

The professional development provided by the OSE Educational Partnership will focus on systems change by providing more efficient and streamlined services to support implementing the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) to support schools in improving equity, access and opportunities for all students.

The OSE Educational Partnership will be comprised of:

- 5 Technical Assistance Partnerships
- 12 Regional Partnership Centers
- 14 Early Childhood Family and Community Engagement Centers, and
- 14 School-age Family and Community Engagement Centers.



The Technical Assistance Partnerships will provide professional development to regional teams and develop materials for various stakeholders. Regional teams will provide direct training and support to families, approved preschool and school-age programs, public schools and districts, and community partners.

### Members of the regional teams will:

- Promote meaningful change within the educational system;
- Promote family and community engagement within the educational system;
- Provide information and training in the areas of literacy, behavior, transition, specially designed instruction, and equity; as well as
- Provide information and training about available service options for students from early childhood through high school.

The OSE Educational Partnership is designed to:

- provide a structure that facilitates systems change efforts and sustainability of those changes;
- > encourage and promote culturally and linguistically responsive and sustaining educational practices that includes families and communities as valued partners;
- > promote greater efficiency and effectiveness in the delivery of high-quality services to families and professionals:
- > create a comprehensive, multi-disciplinary team approach focused on principles from NYSED's <u>Blueprint for Improved Results for Students with Disabilities</u> that supports our stakeholders; and
- > rely on data-based problem-solving and decision-making as well as the use of evidence-based practices.
